Introduction

The global humanitarian organization CARE has been working closely in partnership with the **Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation** to bring talented journalists to see U.S. global investments firsthand. Since 2009, we have hosted more than 20 journalists to capture stories on pressing topics, such as foreign assistance, food security, women's health, emergencies and gender-based violence.

The goal with this four-day field visit is to curate content for powerful storytelling. You'll be traveling with high-level policy makers, government leaders, philanthropists and corporate


executives and have exposure to a variety of perspectives. We usually visit five to seven program sites that showcase a range of implementers from the U.S. government to local NGOs. We believe when journalists interact with the women and families behind the statistics, they will be inspired to write stories about the people who are benefiting from this life-saving work.

CARE has been working on emergency relief and long-term development programs since 1945. Our work spans more than 80 countries, reaching 95M+ people a year.

Snapshot of Work Produced

Many stories and videos have been produced as a result of the Learning Tours. PBS Newshour reported on the urban Syrian Refugee crisis in Jordan, resulting in [this 8-minute piece](#).
