Tabora Region

CARE supported health activities in all 8 districts of Tabora Region

Focus of Activities



- **Objective**: Enhance ability of health systems and communities to respond to pandemics both infectious and non-infectious diseases in Tabora Region.
- The continuity of essential health services and social protection was also a focus

Activities focused on:

- 1. Health systems strengthening at all levels (Regional and District Health Management Teams (R/CHMTs), Health Facilities, Communities)
- 2. Capacitating response to Gender-Based-Violence (among Health Care Workers, local partners, Violence Against Women and Children Committees)

Health Systems Strengthening



- Household hygiene training for 446
 Community Health Workers (CHWs)
- Capacity building on disease surveillance and risk communication to 54 R/CHMTs and 40 Health Care Workers (HCWs)
- Generation of 20 Regional and District mentors on Infection Prevention & Control (IPC)
 - IPC training to 40 Health Care Workers
 - On-site mentorship & supportive supervision on IPC to 248 health care workers (doctors, nurses and midwives)

Health Systems Strengthening



- Provision of essential health services:
 - Distribution of 14,804 new RCH clinic cards to 210 health facilities
 - Induction sessions to 308 HCWs
 - Dissemination of Respectful Maternity Care guidelines
- Built capacity on gender sensitivity in planning/budgeting to 32 district health management teams (CHMTs)
- Procurement of 216 handwashing stations for health facilities

GBV Response: On the Ground Situation



- In a 2020 CARE digital survey conducted among community members, gendered impacts of COVID-19 was a top concern
- CARE's 2020 Rapid Gender Analysis further revealed gendered impacts (domestic duties, mobility, relations)
- TZ guidelines: National Action Plan on Violence Against Women and Children (NPA-VAWC) & Gender and Respectful Maternity Care
- CARE mapped status of local partners responding to GBV as well as village committees for NPA-VAWC

GBV Response: Community Groups



Village Loans & Savings Groups

- With 852 participants of these groups, CARE facilitated social analysis dialogues.
- These dialogues allowed participants to discuss gender relations and action plans.

- Violence against Women & Children Committees
- CARE supported activation and capacity building of 32 village committees for response to **VAWC**

GBV Response: Building System Capacity

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- Training on GBV response to 40 health care workers and 10 Social Welfare Officers
- CARE also built capacity among 18 local organizations for GBV response.







Digital Survey



- To collect feedback from community dialogues and VAWC training participants, CARE partnered with Viamo to conduct a digital survey in June 2021
- 421 participants completed the survey on their mobile phones (199 community dialogues & 222 VAWC participants)
- Community dialogues: Nearly all respondents 89% (177) have had follow up discussions in their community groups on the gender actions established in community dialogues
- VAWC: Nearly all respondents 93% (206) are confident to respond to GBV cases following the VAWC training; majority are developing plans to respond to GBV

Women's Leadership in GBV Response

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"Women especially those who were not privileged to have been to school are facing many challenges, we own nothing in the family nor even considered to get involved in the family resources, we thanks Government and NGO's like CARE for establishing this VAWC committee. Capacity building of GBV response among health care workers, local organizations, village committees

Ongoing forums for participants to discuss and follow up their action plans on addressing gender equality

Support to CHWs, health care workers on household hygiene, surveillance
