LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CEO

This year, as conflicts intensified, disasters struck without warning, and the funding landscape shifted, CARE's teams and partners once again showed what steadfast compassion and ingenuity can achieve. In a world facing profound strain, we have seen extraordinary examples of courage and community leadership, reminders that even amid uncertainty, hope and inspiration are never in short supply.

In 2025, CARE reached **58.7 million people across 121 countries**, more than half of them women and girls. Even as sudden cuts to U.S. and global funding created real challenges, our teams adapted with determination. Their efforts ensured that lifesaving work continued while long-term opportunities for stability and prosperity were strengthened. This commitment — to respond in moments of acute crisis, to sustain progress over time, and to help communities rise — guides our fiscal year 2030 strategy and anchors our mission.

In Kenya, young women leaders like Juliana show how CARE's savings groups can alter the trajectory of a life. She was forced to leave school to care for her siblings and her bedridden mother. Without access to family planning, Juliana became pregnant at 16 and felt her future slipping away. That changed when a CARE community partner connected her to the She Soars program and she gained counseling, practical skills, and the support of a youth savings group. Today, Juliana is pursuing culinary training and building a stable future for herself and her daughter.

In remote Afghan villages where a woman dies in childbirth every two hours, CARE and its local partner OCCD operate clinics providing lifesaving antenatal and postnatal care. In Poshta-e-Murad Khan, 16-year-old Sita — married at 12 and facing dangerous pregnancy complications far from any hospital — survived because she could reach one of these clinics.

In Ecuador, Venezuelan mothers like Nanyely are rebuilding their lives after fleeing one of the world's largest humanitarian crises. When her 13-year-old daughter asked to leave Venezuela so she could eat and access medical care, Nanyely made the agonizing decision to migrate alone, hoping to find work and reunite her family. Today, with support from CARE, she is rebuilding stability, supporting other migrant women, and creating the dignified life she and her daughter deserve.

These stories, repeated thousands of times across continents, reflect something essential: **communities are not only surviving crises — they are leading the way toward solutions and a more hopeful future.** CARE's role is to stand beside them with solidarity, partnership, and unwavering belief in their power.

As we honor CARE's legacy of eight decades of global service, we also embrace a future that demands creativity, innovation, strong alliances, and steadfast commitment. The challenges before us are immense. But so is the collective power of our supporters, partners, staff, and the communities who define and drive this work.

Thank you for standing with CARE through one of the most challenging years in our history. Your generosity and advocacy ensure that we can meet the urgency of today while building the foundations for tomorrow. Together, we carry forward the courage, imagination, and resolve needed to help people not only weather crisis but thrive.

CARE'S IMPACT

Respond. Sustain. Rise.

In 2025, CARE's programs reached 58.7 million people, 57% of whom were women and girls. Even as sudden U.S. funding cuts created serious challenges, CARE continued to meet urgent needs while supporting long-term stability and economic opportunity. As global crises grow more complex, CARE remains committed to working alongside communities to end poverty.

When a ground-splitting earthquake rocked Myanmar in March, community leaders like Mai showed how fast, locally led action saves lives. Her knowledge and quick response reflect CARE's approach to crisis response that is community-driven, efficient, and rooted in local leadership.

In Yemen, women farmers are growing more than food — they are building stability and hope. Through seeds, tools, water access, and hands-on training provided close to home, CARE works with communities to strengthen interconnected systems of food security, health, education, and climate resilience. These gardens now help nourish families, support school attendance, and strengthen community bonds.

In Uganda, women members of Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLAs) are using digital tools and new access to capital to expand businesses, support their families, and strengthen local markets. Through partnerships with local organizations, CARE helps ensure women have the financial resources, skills, and opportunities they need to grow economic power that benefits whole communities.

Together, these stories show the promise of CARE's vision: communities equipped not only to withstand crisis, but to thrive.

After a 7.7-magnitude earthquake struck Myanmar, Mai, a longtime CARE volunteer, acted quickly to help her neighbors. Even with a broken foot and damage to her own home, she joined others to rescue people trapped under collapsed buildings and used her deep knowledge of the community to guide urgent response efforts.

As families left unsafe homes and struggled to find clean water, Mai worked with CARE and local partners to assess needs and make sure people received safe water, shelter, and protection.

Mai's leadership shows how local responders save lives quickly because they know their communities best. CARE works alongside leaders like Mai to support responses that are fast, cost-efficient, and grounded in local experience. By strengthening community networks, CARE establishes lifesaving, inclusive emergency responses led by the people most affected.

In Yemen's Taiz Governorate, where years of conflict have disrupted daily life, CARE works with local communities to help women like Bushra support their families with healthy food, clean water, education, and healthcare. With millions struggling to meet basic needs, CARE and the World Food Programme supported 200 women farmers with seeds, tools, simple irrigation systems, and hands-on training designed for learners with limited reading skills. These home gardens now provide families with a variety of nutritious foods and help women earn money for essentials like school supplies.

By holding training sessions close to participants' homes and creating spaces where women learn together, CARE helps build practical skills, mutual support, and confidence. This community-led approach strengthens families' access to healthy food and new opportunities – planting the seeds for stability in the years ahead.

Women in savings groups across Uganda are strengthening their financial futures as CARE and local partners expand economic opportunities. After arriving in Kampala as a refugee from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Mwila helped form the Vital Solidarity savings group and led efforts to digitize members' records through Chomoka, a CARE-developed financial app now managed by Ensibuuko.

With digital records opening doors to lenders and credit scorers, women without formal documentation can now use their savings history to qualify for larger loans. With this access, Mwila opened her own retail shop – building confidence and inspiring other women to start businesses of their own.

Together, these women are saving more, shaping financial tools that work for them, accessing local markets, and strengthening the economic well-being of their families and communities.

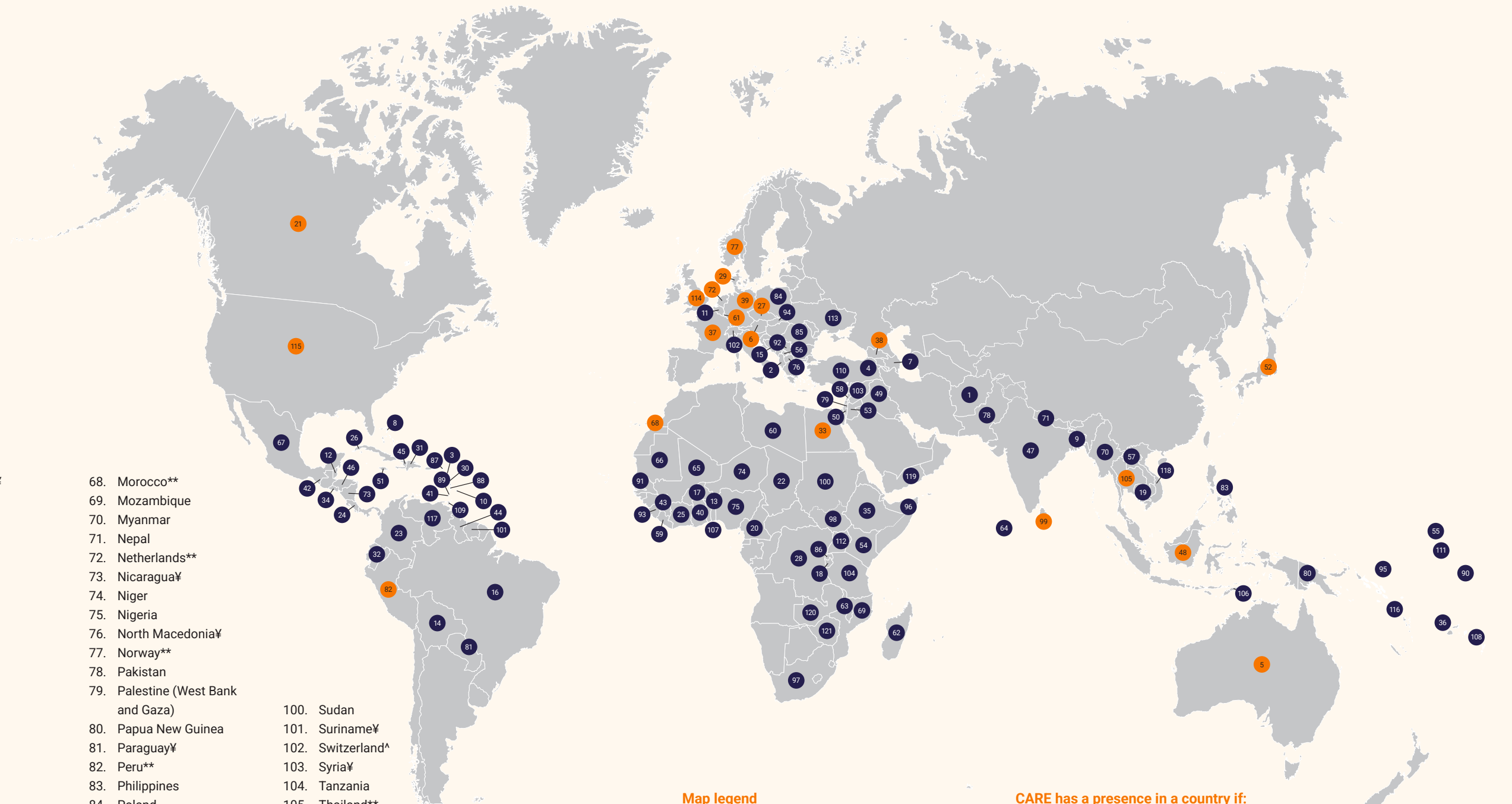

Every gift shows you care

Marietta Bala's connection to CARE began in the 1940s, when she and her fourth-grade classmates packed CARE PACKAGE® boxes. "We each took a box home with a list of items," said Marietta. With help from her parents, Marietta sent her first CARE PACKAGE® box — and never stopped caring. She became a regular donor as a college student and has supported CARE ever since. This year, she made a significant contribution following the U.S. funding cuts and also generously supported school meal programs in Somaliland and Guatemala that provide children with nutrition and education while strengthening families, communities, and local farmers, laying the groundwork for lasting impact.

Joe and Rose Wernicke know firsthand that a gift of care can last a lifetime. After World War II, Joe and his family received lifesaving CARE PACKAGE® boxes in Poland. He recalls boxes from an "Aunt Clara," always including chocolate Hershey's Kisses. He promised to support the organization one day. He and his wife Rose have honored that promise since the 1980s. This year, when the need was greatest, Joe and Rose made their most generous donation yet.

When **Donald Hastings** made his first gift to CARE, his only instruction was "make me proud." Wanting to use his resources to make a difference in the world, Donald lived simply and intentionally, repairing what he could and managing his resources with care. When he passed away unexpectedly in February, he left his entire estate to CARE — a substantial legacy built through hard work and selfless frugality. He chose CARE for its efficiency and low administrative costs, trusting the organization to use his gift where it will matter most. His legacy of generosity will live on, and CARE will *make him proud*.



FEATURED FOUNDATIONS

CARE's partnership with the **Gates Foundation** expands economic opportunities, improves access to healthcare, and promotes equal opportunity. In Uganda, CARE is working with financial service providers and digital companies through the Digital Data Trails for Credit initiative to digitize VSLA records, help women build reliable credit histories, and expand their access to formal financial services. CARE will use lessons from this initiative to support women entrepreneurs and help VSLAs strengthen or evolve into savings cooperatives.

With Foundation support, CARE has also worked with local communities to provide lifesaving assistance for communities affected by natural disasters. CARE has reached more than 150,000 people affected by a cholera outbreak in South Sudan, repeated typhoons in the Philippines, and flooding in Northern Nigeria with clean water, sanitation kits, hygiene information, and safe spaces during emergencies. Through research, CARE and the Foundation are building evidence on how to reduce child marriage while recognizing the links between education, economics, and social norms. CARE continues to lead the sector in championing U.S. leadership in international assistance and humanitarian response by sharing evidence on the most cost-effective investments and by hosting Learning Tours that highlight community-led impact.

DRC

Generous funding from the **David and Lucile Packard Foundation** enabled CARE to respond to crises in Sudan and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) where conflict has displaced millions and left families facing hunger, violence, and the loss of their livelihoods. With Packard's support, CARE and our local partners provided healthcare, food, clean water, protection, and cash assistance in Sudan. In DRC, CARE delivered essential protection, healthcare, and services for water and sanitation while prioritizing the needs of women and girls, including survivors of violence.

CÔTE D'IVOIRE

The **Hershey Company** has been part of the CARE story since the very beginning. Hershey's chocolate bars were included in the original CARE Package, delivering hope and comfort to families rebuilding after World War II. Nearly 80 years later, our partnership is stronger than ever.

In 2023, The Hershey Company, CARE, and other partners launched the Hershey Income Accelerator Program, a program centered on helping cocoa-farming households build lasting economic security in Côte d'Ivoire. It provides cash transfers, access to savings and loan groups, skills training, and support to start or grow small businesses. These resources help farmers diversify their income, reduce reliance on a single crop, and build a more secure future for their families.

Together, CARE and The Hershey Company are expanding economic opportunity for farmers, ensuring they have the resources, skills, and support to lead their families and strengthen their communities.

FEATURED CORPORATE PARTNERS

The **AbbVie Foundation** is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit working to create lasting change in communities worldwide so that everyone can live their healthiest life.

In 2025, the AbbVie Foundation and CARE, alongside **Morehouse School of Medicine, Lyft,** and the **Atlanta Community Food Bank,** created a new program that provides complete, connected support and services to pregnant people in underserved communities in Atlanta. The purpose of the new program is to address critical disparities and improve maternal health.

The two-year pilot offers support that goes beyond traditional healthcare, including pre- and post-natal education, the delivery of iron-rich foods, transportation

to and from appointments, and cash assistance. Addressing these barriers together helps reduce gaps in care, which is vital to improving health outcomes.

Through this cross-sector partnership, CARE and the AbbVie Foundation are building a support network that will directly reach 150 pregnant people and their families and indirectly benefit as many as 3,600 people across Atlanta communities.

Insights from the pilot will enable CARE to effectively expand this innovative approach to address other health needs in communities across the U.S. and beyond.



Since 1992, CARE and **The Starbucks Foundation** have partnered to strengthen communities that grow coffee, tea, and cocoa. Together, we're creating stronger futures by expanding economic opportunity and supporting women to lead change.

Today, The Starbucks Foundation is working toward a bold goal: to positively impact 1 million women and girls in origin communities by 2030. CARE is proud to help achieve this goal by supporting women's leadership, economic resilience, and long-term livelihoods in:

- **Côte d'Ivoire:** Supporting women's empowerment in cocoa communities
- **Vietnam:** Helping women build resilient livelihoods for women coffee producers
- **Uganda:** Expanding Farmer Field and Business Schools
- **Indonesia:** Strengthening economic opportunities in tea-growing regions

Across these countries, women are building powerful networks. Since launching these programs in 2023, we have directly reached nearly 10,000 people, including 7,900 women and girls. Women are gaining access to financial services, stepping into leadership roles,

growing household incomes, and diversifying how they support their families.

Together, we're not only supporting women farmers, fueling long-term change in communities and supply chains around the world.

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LETTER FROM CFO

Resilience through diversification and disciplined stewardship

Fiscal year 2025 was a defining year for CARE USA. We faced significant external disruptions, difficult operational decisions, and tests of our organizational resilience. Across the humanitarian and development sector, funding became more unpredictable as global crises placed extraordinary pressure on the communities we serve.

Despite this challenging environment, CARE stayed focused on our mission and continued to deliver large-scale programs worldwide. Total program expenses in FY25 reached \$748 million, representing an 11% decrease from FY24, but still reflecting a strong global reach. Our work remained almost evenly split across our two core pillars – Humanitarian Response (54%) and Development Programming (46%) – showing both our agility to respond quickly and our commitment to long-term solutions.

Total revenue declined 10% (\$88 million) compared to FY24, driven primarily by a 31% (\$110 million) reduction in U.S. Government funding. Stop-work orders affected operations in 32 countries, resulting in the discontinuation of approximately \$130 million in active funding. These disruptions required CARE to make extremely difficult decisions, including releasing approximately 1,500 staff, profoundly impacting colleagues and the communities they served.

In this context, CARE's diversified revenue base was essential. Private revenue increased by 6% (\$12 million), reflecting the strong commitment of our donors during a time of rising global need. Support from CARE International members also grew by 5% (\$12 million), highlighting the strength of our global network and shared impact. Together, these revenue streams helped sustain operations through a period of heightened uncertainty.

CARE remained disciplined and responsible in our financial management. In FY25, 90% of total expenses were directed to program delivery, reinforcing our commitment to efficiency and ensuring that every dollar entrusted to CARE advances meaningful change.

We know that funding from the U.S. government and other donors will continue to decline. We are preparing to make the most of our resources and to seek additional private donations. As we look to the future, we remain focused on strengthening our financial resilience and safeguarding program outcomes in an increasingly complex global environment.

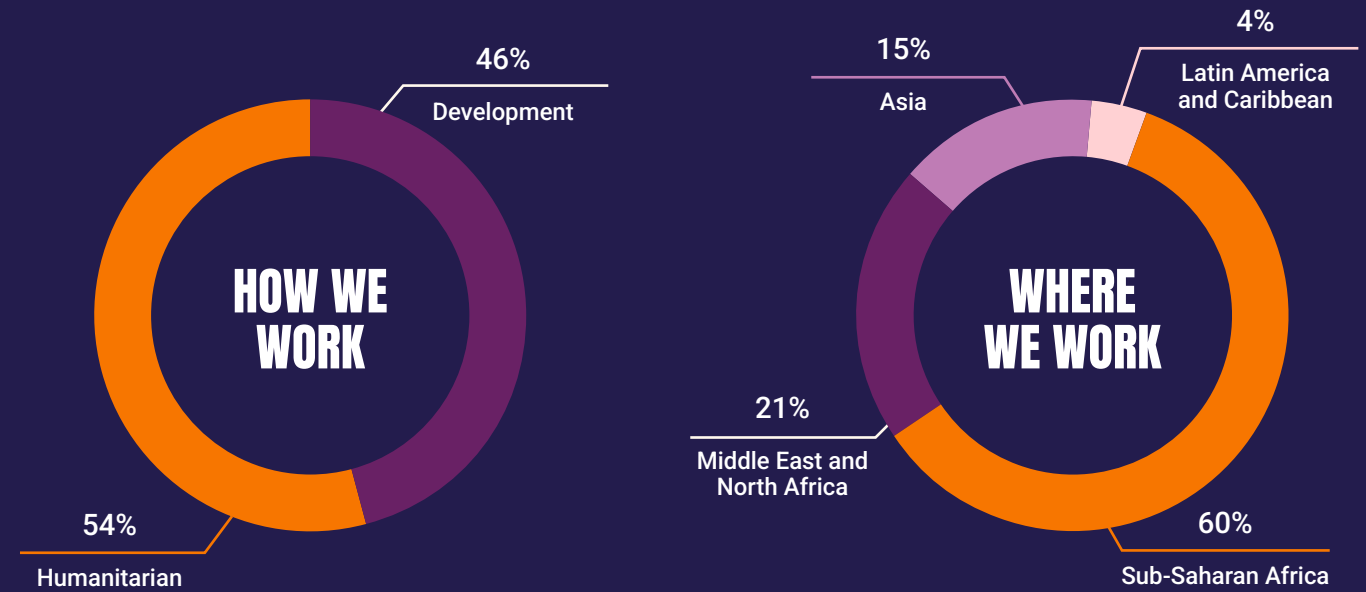

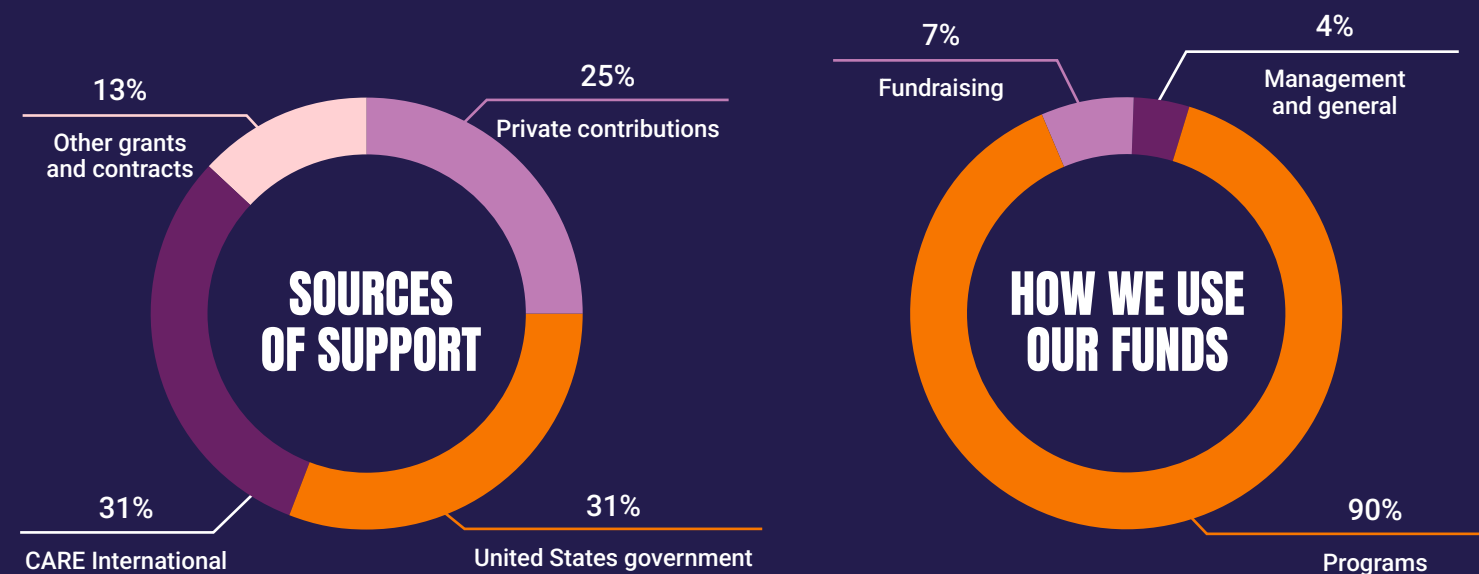
